All payments will be made by check and sent to the winning club officials.





The basic outline of the Al Langley Memorial Scholarship is as follows:

- The student and family must be a member of an ATV Maine affiliated club for at least two years.
- Letters of recommendation and support from the principal, teachers, and friends are required with the application.
- A list of present and past employment should accompany the application.
- A transcript of grades and the attendance record is required as well.
- A list of organizations and outside interests the student has been involved in is recommended.
- A typed or printed essay of 300 words covering the sport of ATV's and how it relates to one of the following topics is required:

Recreation

Conservation

ATV Safety

Economic Impact to State and local areas

The applicants will be scored on the preceding topics and the winning recipient will be notified. The \$1,000.00 bank check will be sent directly to the school after completion of the first semester and attaining a C grade or higher.

- Whenever possible, ask permission in person.
- The first minute of the interaction with the landowner is the most important. The immediate impression a user makes will set the tone and will have a big impact on whether the landowner grants permission or not.
- Don't act like you have a right to use the property; you don't.
- Make sure you follow any specific directions from the landowner. If the landowner limits use to a specific road, stay on that road.
- Even if the answer is no, be polite. A landowner might change their mind in the future.
- If you are using someone's property and see trash left by someone else, pick it up. Few things irritate landowners more than finding garbage, bottles, etc. left behind.

 Ask what the club and/or ATV community could do for them; i.e. bridges, brush clean up, harvest roads, etc.

- Before and after pictures of trail maintenance work that the club has done on their trails. This might help landowners understand that the club intends to take care of the property.
- Express concern to the landowner for environmentally sensitive areas that might be impacted by a trail.
- Agree to size and type of any bridge that may be needed on landowner property.

SIGNAGE AND SAFETY

The State of Maine's ATV trail system is becoming the best in the Northeast. It continues to expand by leaps and bounds. Individual club trail systems are now being connected so that travel from point "A" to "B" is now expanding to "C", "D", and "E", interlinking one trail system into another. As an example, the Sunrise Trail System is now connected to the Aroostook County Trail System. This, in itself, is remarkable and a great improvement from several years ago, and the MATS [Maine All-terrain Trail System] is being developed, with some trails already marked and used as MATS. Still, the problem of being able to follow a trail or stay on a trail remains the same. How do I find a trail? How do I stay on a trail? Where are the signs?

Signage is an ongoing maintenance job and unless done, staying on a legal trail is not possible. Signage, as I understand it, is accomplished each spring by each club responsible for their portion of the trail system. The problem is that this does not last. The sign(s) is/are there today and gone tomorrow, for whatever reason. I will admit Mother Nature does play her part in the demise of a lot of signs. Nevertheless, every rider depends on proper well-placed, visible, legible signs to travel in a clubs' trail system. Signs with good, solid information on trail direction, destination directions, food and fuel locations, and general ATV signs telling them they have made the correct turn and are still on a legal trail are essential. The "MAINE ATV TRAIL SIGNING GUIDELINES" pamphlet is the perfect reference.

Signage is done for a very specific purpose, to mark an approved ATV trail for legal and safety purposes. Therefore, every rider has legal and safety concerns; legal, in that a rider is required to be on an approved ATV trail; safety, because riding in some systems means getting to a food and fuel stop may be a very real problem, along with being found if lost!

For the most part, every rider knows the local system they ride in and knows certain parts of that system extremely well. It's when a rider departs the local area that the challenge begins. Where are the trail signs? How far apart are they placed on the trail so that I will know I'm still on the trail? Are they visible and clearly marked? Are there directions to food and fuel locations, and how many miles is it to get there?

I'm not sure how the signing of trails is accomplished by individual clubs, but it would seem to me that more is better, especially since our trail maps do not really match a good topographical or atlas map. Every rider must rely on signs being placed along each trail and at each intersection. If these signs are not there, someone who is unfamiliar has a problem getting around the system. Then it's, "Which way do I turn or go?" "Am I still on the trail?" "How do I get out of here?" "Where am I now?". These are the questions

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because signage was not maintained throughout that part of the ATV trail system and/or, someone or something has done something to the signs which were there.

Safety is a real concern to all of us and is rarely thought of until it's too late. We all know that not everyone who goes out to ride carries a reserve supply of fuel, "just in case". We also know that not everyone who goes out to ride has a GPS with them and knows how to use it. Many riders do not carry the basic equipment required to take care of a flat tire problem. Cell phone connection is unreliable unless the person can get high enough to get a signal. In some trail systems, the places to purchase fuel are few and far between. This means that sometimes a rider is arriving at a place to purchase fuel almost on fumes. If the appropriate sign was not there, then the rider may have to walk to find a place to buy fuel and possibly walking in the wrong direction is very real. Now we have a lost rider in the system and we all know that there are days when we never meet or rarely meet another person on a trail who can help us.

These problems begin to involve the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife and their search and rescue ability. Safety in this case comes at a cost. Therefore, it is very important to have each person who goes out in a system to ride to be able to know where they are and find their way back, or get to a safe location through proper signage.

Liability is the other thing most riders do not let pass through their minds until it's a close call or too late. If it's a close call, the liability thought may be very fleeting until something else happens to remind them of the incident. This is also very costly in dollars and privileges taken away. Rights and privileges are very different; yet, many look at them as the same thing. According to the American Heritage Dictionary, rights - "That which is just, morally good, legal, proper, or fitting", and privilege - "A special advantage, immunity, permission, right, or benefit granted to or enjoyed by an individual, a class, or a cast". Therefore, ATVing is a privilege, not a right. A right that can be taken away when abused or violated.

The cost of maintaining trails and signs is a big concern. This is measured in time and money, at both the state and local level. Most of us never think of that aspect of the problem or what the consequences will be when ATV'ers get lost.

The important thing here is that this is a very correctable problem. All of us who ride find a situation where the signs are not there or there are too few of them. This is reportable to the club maintaining that part of the system or to the ATV Maine Trails Committee. Our failure as individuals to report these problems for correction when we find them falls squarely on our shoulders as riders. "They", the club or ATV Maine Trails Committee, cannot resolve a problem if "They" are not informed of one.

The State of Maine wants to increase the economic impact of ATVing in all areas of the state. To accomplish this, the trail system must be clearly signed with signage that provides appropriate information, i.e., food, fuel, location, destination, and mileage. If this is done, along with an informative trail map, every rider is going to have a great time riding each and every time out. Then, the State of Maine's ATV trail system will be the

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riding destination of all those non-resident ATV'ers and those recreational dollars they want to spend. Additionally, residents are going to want to expand their trail riding to other parts of the state, to enjoy the sport to the fullest, which means the better you make the trail information posted, the better the ride is for all who ride your clubs trails.

"The following are standard issued ATV signs in the state of Maine. Most of these signs are available to aid ATV clubs or landowners from the ATV program at the Bureau of Parks and Lands. Signs should be installed using the guidelines that follow:" {these come from the Maine ATV Trail Signing Guidelines}

Trail Blazer: This sign should be used at regular intervals along the trail to reassure the rider



that they are still on the trail. A blazer immediately beyond an intersection or road crossing informs a rider whether the trail continues on the other side. This is especially important when the crossing is not direct. If the trail is further away and harder to see, you may need to use a trail identification sign since it's larger and easier to see. The more often you use a trail blazer on any trail, makes it

much easier for the rider to know that he/she is on a legal ATV trail.

found in your clubs' trail system.

Trail Identification: This sign should be used at the beginning of a trail, such as at a club sleep



house, parking lot, or place of business etc. It should be used to show the trail name, number, destination, and/or direction of travel (North, South, East, or West), etc. as well as the name of the club maintaining the trail. In some instances the sign can be used instead of a trailblazer, as it may be easier to see at the entrance from a field or other large clearing. This is also a very good sign to have approximately 50 yards down a trail from an intersection to let the rider know that they are on the correct trail they want to be on; additionally, the trail number, or trail name, should be placed on this

sign in good bold print.

Trail Information

Trail Information: This sign should be used together with other signs to provide additional information that is helpful to the user. It can be used to mark town lines and geographic names as well as distance and directions to businesses or destinations, etc., to help orient the rider. If a club has a trail map they want to note reference points such as a trail name or number to match the map. We recommend you use a paint marker when writing on the signs. Regular markers tend to fade quickly in the sun and may soon be unreadable. Trail information signs should definitely be used to give information to every rider as to where food, fuel, and lodging can be



Directional Arrow: This sign is used to show right- or left-hand turns. It is generally not used to mark the trail straight ahead; a trailblazer is used for that. The arrows should be placed far enough

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in advance of a corner to allow the ATV operator ample time to slow down. The actual distance necessary will vary depending on the normal traveled speed of the trail it's located on and how sharp the corner is. The directional arrow should not be written on. The trail information sign is where you should write any information that is required.



ATV Access Route: This is a Department of Transportation steel sign that is available through a private sign company. This is the sign that is to be used if a public road is officially designated for use by ATVs. This has to be purchased by the club or Municipality and must be installed on authorized roads instead of the regular ATV trail signs. You may want to also post a speed limit sign under it to further regulate the use.

Remember, it is the landowner who give us permission to use their land, so it behooves us to make sure the signage for those trails to be the very best possible, to maintain a positive relationship with landowners and their land open for the trails we want to ride. Good signage is safety for everyone involved in the sport of AT-Ving. Signage is a major problem for every rider going into a club system to find food, fuel, and lodging, let alone trying to stay on a legal trail.

There are other trail signs that need to be considered in every club trail system from



a safety and a consideration standpoint. If a trail or a section of trail has been closed and nobody is supposed to be going on it, then a NO ATV Blazer should be placed at the head of the trail or intersection so that every rider knows the trail is closed and they are not supposed to be on it. The addition of a date on the No ATV Blazer also helps.



The Stay on Marked trails blazer reminds riders that the trail they are on is with the permission of a landowner, and we should definitely stay on a marked trail.

Caution, STOP AHEAD, and STOP signs are warning blazers; three other signs that should be used to make your trail system safer for every rider.





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






Three signs that should appear in every trail system are GAS, FOOD, or GAS & FOOD, at trail intersections along with the entrance to every clubs' trail system, with mileage information to the location. Knowing where you can get gas for your ATV and food to eat in your clubs' trail system is extremely important to every ATV/UTV rider, especially in trail systems that are away from the bigger towns and cities.

Last but not least, lodging is one of those things that is important to ATV riders taking trips, especially if it is a multi-day trip. There is nothing like being caught between locations and realizing that by the time you get back to your starting point it's going to be extremely late into the night, and you need to find a place to stay out of the trail. Finding lodging in a clubs' trail system is one

Signage is an important task for every ATV club. It really makes or breaks a clubs' trail system in the eyes of the

riders who come into it and will pass through it.


There is nothing more frustrating when riding in a club trail system where the signage is extremely deplorable. Poor signage leaves a very negative attitude towards the club and their trail system. This is the reason why it is strongly encouraged, and was by Bill Lombard especially, to make all club signage an A+ rating. Good visible signage is the key to a great trail system; anything less is pure frustration to any rider trying to go into, through or out of a poorly signed trail system.

Let's make sure that your clubs' trail system is a Bill Lombard A+ on every trail; one that every ATV rider is going to enjoy being in, remember, and want to return to. Therefore, it is very important that signage maintenance and upgrade be an ongoing accomplishment of every club. This will draw riders into it and through it because of the outstanding directions it gives. Make Bill Lombard proud as he looks down from his place in Heaven, for the job that your club has done with trail signage.


DLR ATV CLUB HAS BEEN DISBANDED
